NEW ACQUISITION

Exception to the Yam: A Wooden Abelam Helmet Mask

For Papua New Guinea's Abelam culture, masks are more often made for yams than men. Seven months out of each year are spent ceremonially competing to produce the longest yams, which can grow up to a length of twelve feet. The yams are then decorated with masks and an array of other adornments and exchanged with trade partners. This rare mask is something of an outlier. Most Abelam yam masks are made of wickerwork, and masks that are worn by Abelam men during ceremonies tend to be larger in scale but are otherwise similar in materials and design to yam masks. This mask is made of wood, but still bears some elements that appear in yam masks. For example, a dog-tooth ornament worn by important men is translated here and in some yam masks as a diademshaped ridge. The holes at the

bottom of the mask would have been used to attach a sago leaf body covering, and the broken finial may have originally been used to secure a feather headdress.

A MESSAGE FROM PAUL GRAVETT, CURATOR OF ASIAN COMICS: EVOLUTION OF AN ART FORM

Osamu Tezuka (1928-1989), the creator of *Astro Boy*, revered in Japan as their 'God of Manga', firmly believed, 'Comics is an international language that can cross boundaries and generations. Comics is a bridge between all cultures.' It is in this spirit that The Bowers Museum is offering visitors the chance to experience *Asian Comics: Evolution of an Art Form*, the largest and most varied exhibition so far of comics from over twenty countries in the region.

In the USA, manga made in Japan are by far the most familiar type from Asia, but the medium is also dynamic elsewhere, delivering powerful graphic novels or addictive digital webtoons, several of them adapted into films and television series, both live action and animated, that have become international successes. Their multimedia influence has also spread still farther to the worlds of music, fashion, fine art and technology. *Asian Comics* is an invitation to explore and stimulate your curiosity. As well as discovering the exquisite


original artworks crafted by gifted cartoonists in inks, paints and pixels, you will also have the chance to go behind the scenes and discover scripts, layouts and other stages that lead their creators to the finished pages. Additionally, precious printed comics, magazines and books will be on display, many never shown here before. This medium also comes in other surprising forms, such as India's traditional painted scrolls and portable shrines.

Rather than separating these exhibits by country of origin, *Asian Comics* presents them side-by-side and organised into six thematic sections, to reveal both connections and contrasts and their shared histories, faiths and folklore. Tezuka understood the power of comics, because he always knew how much story and emotion can be conveyed clearly to everyone in their pictures alone.

As I reflect on the incredible journey we embarked upon with our esteemed Fellows of Bowers Museum through the enchanting landscapes of Madagascar in the fall of 2023, I am filled with a sense of profound gratitude and awe.

We began in Antananarivo on the 16th. The city was lively, offering a warm welcome to our adventure. By the 20th, we found ourselves in the beautiful Andasibe National Park. The sights there were stunning, especially the Parson's chameleon with its striking colors. Hearing the unique calls of the Indri lemur was a memorable moment. Our visit to Lemur Island was delightful, seeing these charming creatures up close.

On the 22nd, we visited the Avenue of the Baobabs. Standing among these ancient trees, some over 800 years old, was a humbling experience. In Kirindy Reserve, we encountered various wildlife including the elusive fossa and numerous chameleon species.

By the 25th, we were exploring the Ranomafana Rainforest. The biodiversity here was extraordinary. Seeing the rare golden bamboo lemur was a highlight for all of us. An evening conversation with a wildlife researcher enriched our understanding greatly.

The final part of our trip, from September 28th to October 2nd, took us through Anja Reserve, Isalo National Park, and Zombitse-Vohibasia. Each place showed us the diverse beauty of Madagascar. Watching the ring-tailed lemurs at Anja, experiencing the majestic landscapes of Isalo, and exploring the unique environment of Zombitse-Vohibasia were all remarkable.

Leaving Madagascar on October 2nd was bittersweet. This journey was not just a trip; it was an enlightening experience, bringing us closer to nature and its wonders. The memories from this adventure will stay with me and our Bowers Museum Fellows for a long time.
