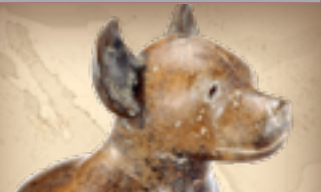

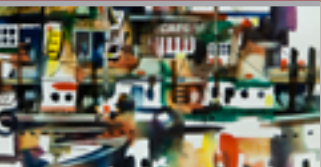

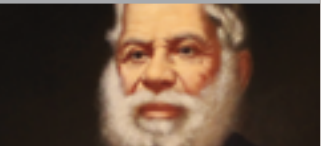

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Aloha museum supporters and friends!

As Bowers Museum continues its 90-year legacy of presenting world cultures with depth, beauty, and scholarship, the latter half of 2026 promises to be a landmark period for our institution and our audiences. Four upcoming presentations—each distinct in voice, geography, and artistic vision—reflect our commitment to bringing global creativity to Southern California in ways that inspire, challenge, and connect.

We begin with *Picasso Ceramics from the Rosenbaum Collection*, curated by University of Málaga professor and renowned Picasso-expert Salvador Haro González. This exhibition offers a rare look at Picasso's playful, inventive ceramic works—objects that reveal the artist's lifelong fascination with form, myth, and material. It is a privilege to share these pieces with our community and to deepen public understanding of Picasso's lesser-known but profoundly influential explorations in clay over a 30-year period.

Next, we present contemporary artist and Stanford professor Xiaoze Xie and his powerful re-imagining of the Dunhuang Library Cave. His work bridges past and present, illuminating how ancient knowledge—once safeguarded in these historically significant and magnificent desert caves—continues to shape modern identity and artistic expression. This exhibition invites visitors to consider how memory, preservation, and reinvention remained central to cultural survival along the ancient Silk Road.

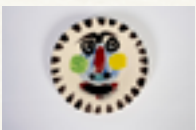
In November, we are also proud to unveil a new gallery dedicated to Mexican and Central American art from Bowers Museum's permanent collection, curated by Getty Research Institute Associate Director Khristaan Villela. This high-profile space celebrates the richness of ancient Mesoamerican art, including Mayan and Aztec masterpieces, as well as more contemporary works. Fresh interpretation and renewed visibility will open your eyes to the beauty and wonder of these cultures while highlighting artworks that anchor our institution's global mission.

Finally, a special exhibition gallery will explore the history of Bowers Museum itself—*Bowers Legacy: The Making of a Museum* honoring Charles and Ada Bowers, whose vision and generosity laid the foundation for the museum we know today. Their story reminds us that cultural institutions thrive when communities believe in the power of art and invest in its future.

Together, these exhibitions, along with the accompanying programs and activities, embody our ongoing commitment to presenting world cultures with authenticity, scholarship, and empathy. I am confident that you will find much to discover and enjoy at Bowers in the months ahead!

NEW ACQUISITION

Dogon Copper Sculpture

Today, the Dogon primarily reside in Mali's Bandiagara Escarpment cliffs, recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1989. Archaeological evidence places them there since the 15th century, displaced by the invading Mossi people. According to their oral traditions, their ancestors arrived on the cliffside by crossing the Niger River on the back of a crocodile. Other tales credit crocodiles with showing the Dogon ancestors sources of water after their migration. Seen here in the form of a dugout canoe, crocodiles are still protected and considered sacred by the Dogon today.

Local blacksmiths, thought to be endowed with special abilities, perfected the lost-wax technique for casting small metal sculptures like these. There is no evidence of copper mining in the region, so the metal was likely obtained through the trans-Saharan trade. According to Dogon thought, copper shares the essence of Nommo, their revered ancestral spirits. Metals were used for ritual objects, including miniature sculptures that would be placed on personal altars to anchor the spiritual power of the ancestors to whom they were dedicated.

Pablo Picasso (1881–1973) is one of the most significant and influential artists in the history of art. Born in Málaga, Spain, he stood out from an early age for his extraordinary talent for drawing and painting. Throughout his career, he explored various stylistic periods, including the Blue Period, the Rose Period, and Cubism—which he invented alongside Georges Braque—a movement that broke with traditional representations of space and perspective and profoundly transformed the artistic language of the 20th century. The scope and influence of his artistic legacy remain essential to understanding the evolution of the artistic avant-garde and contemporary art.



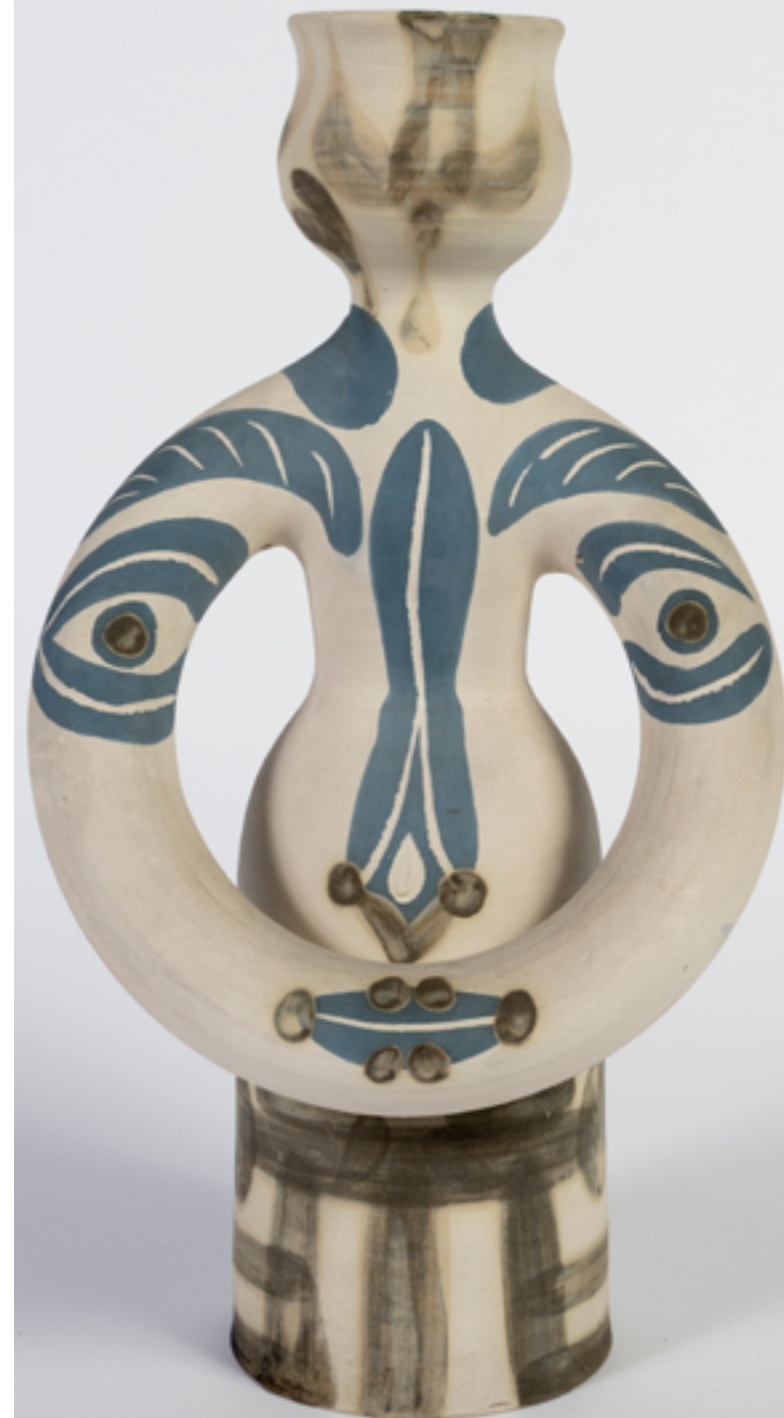

In addition to his prolific body of paintings, he made significant contributions to disciplines such as sculpture, printmaking, scenic design, and ceramics, demonstrating a constant willingness to experiment. *Picasso Ceramics from the Rosenbaum Collection* explores this latter foray. Although he made some early attempts in his youth, it was not until the summer of 1946 that his interest in the democratic medium was sparked by a trip to Suzanne and Georges Ramié's Madoura Pottery workshop. He returned the following year, beginning a quarter-century period in which he produced approximately 4,000 ceramics.

Ceramic processes and techniques posed an enormous and intriguing challenge for Picasso, as he had to paint on a three-dimensional surface using a muted palette. His ceramics are the legacy of many of Picasso's artistic concerns dating back to his Cubist period; they feature motifs both familiar and new to the artist and are, in some ways and instances, a continuation of the ancient Mediterranean pottery tradition.

Through a selection of limited-edition and original print ceramics from the Rosenbaum Collection, the exhibition will highlight both the value of Picasso's ceramics as works of art—due to their artistic qualities and significance—and their importance in understanding the artist's complete body of work.

Picasso Ceramics from the Rosenbaum Collection is organized by Landau Traveling Exhibitions, Los Angeles, CA, with contributions from Bowers Museum and guest curator Dr. Salvador Haro González.

BOWERS LEGACY

The Making of a Museum

Opening Nov 21, 2026

Bowers Museum, originally called the Charles W. Bowers Memorial Museum, opened its doors on February 15, 1936, becoming Orange County's first formal museum. Though the name of the institution might suggest the singular efforts of one individual, the process of building, decorating, populating, and running the museum was a thoroughly collaborative effort. It took many motivated professionals coming together to accomplish this great feat, especially considering that this happened at the height of the worst economic crisis in the history of the United States. Organized on the occasion of Bowers Museum's 90th anniversary, *Bowers Legacy: The Making of a Museum* explores the founding of Orange County's largest museum by looking at these individuals as well as the construction of the museum and its earliest exhibitions.

Of course, Charles and Ada Bowers are the foremost names in this history, igniting the spark that led to the museum's founding. Charles Wesley Bowers (1842–1929) settled in Santa Ana in the late 19th century. His first marriage to Eliza Wilks in 1902 ended abruptly in 1905 with her untimely passing. Ada Elvira Abbott (1846–1931), also a transplant to California, married Charles Bowers in 1908. The Bowers made their money from citrus growing. They were described as quiet and financially conservative people who took a great interest in history. Desiring a space to preserve Orange County's past, the couple set up a trust in 1924 that, upon their deaths, transferred ownership of their property to the City of Santa Ana for the specific purpose of constructing and maintaining a museum. After the passing of Charles Bowers in 1929 and Ada Bowers in 1931, the Santa Ana City Council unanimously accepted the trust mobilizing the creation of the museum.

Architects Frank Lansdown and W. Horace Austin were selected to design the original building. The Mission-Revival style they drew upon visually and symbolically aligned the building with Southern California's colonial and rancho past. Given that the construction fell during the Great Depression, it was important that the builders be residents of Santa Ana. The contractor William Rohrbacher's successful bid of \$54,080 included a commitment to employ local workers. The old Victorian home that Charles and Ada Bowers lived in was demolished and construction began in 1932. The iconic painted and molded plaster ceilings of the original building, now called the Historic Wing, were designed

and carried out by European-born artist Martin Syvertsen and his assistant Carl Schabell. Ada May Sharpless, a prominent sculptor who grew up in Santa Ana, designed The Ada E. Bowers Memorial Fountain, now a beautiful flower bed in the museum's courtyard.

Aside from the Bowers family themselves, none was more pivotal to Bowers Museum's founding than its first curator, Bessie Beth Coulter. Tasked with filling a museum which only held a few token artifacts from Charles and Ada Bowers, she worked her way across the county knocking on doors and building up the museum's collection. The earliest loans and donations to Bowers focused on the county: Native American artifacts discovered through archaeological excavations and local construction, the vestiges of California's Spanish and Mexican history that are in Bowers' *California Missions and Ranchos* exhibition today, and pivotal collections of California plein air art that are still on display in *California Bounty*.

Though Bowers has continuously grown in square footage and scope over these past 90 years, the museum stays true to the original vision of its founders in creating a space for audiences to learn about the history of the place that they live, as well as the vast world that the museum's permanent collections now reflect.

ART OF MEXICO AND CENTRAL AMERICA

Opening Nov 21, 2026

Bowers Museum has a rich collection of art from Mexico and Central America, with some of its earliest acquisitions entering the collection within the museum's first two decades. Today, the museum houses approximately 4,200 objects from the region, including more than 2,500 from Mexico alone. Spanning antiquity to the present day, the collection features remarkable ceramics and vessels alongside paintings and prints created in the 20th and 21st centuries by artists living in the region and within diasporic communities in California.

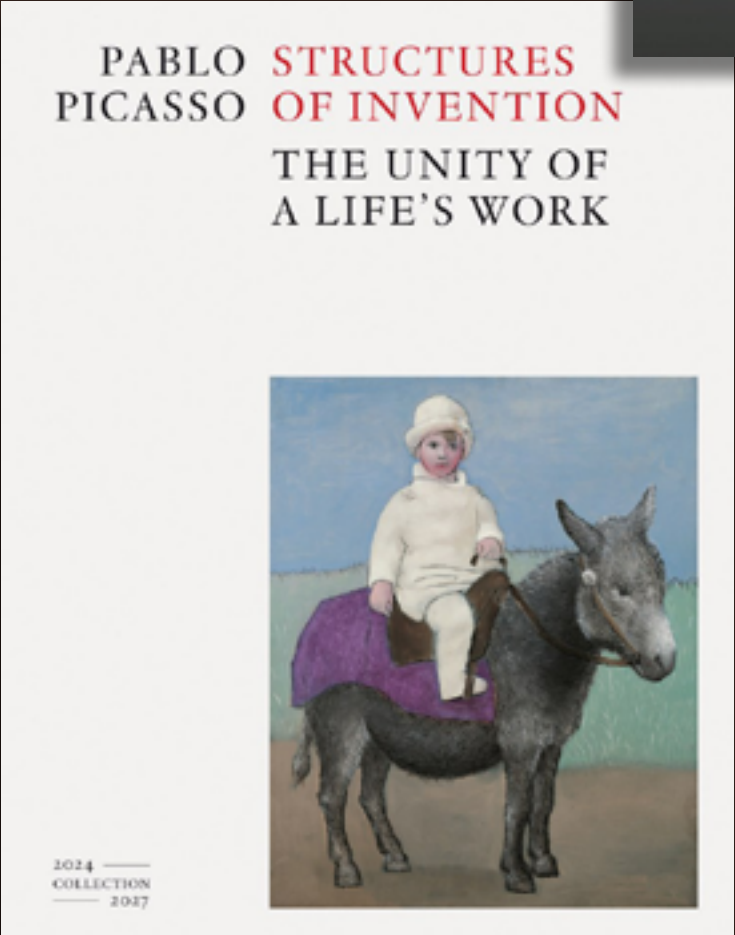
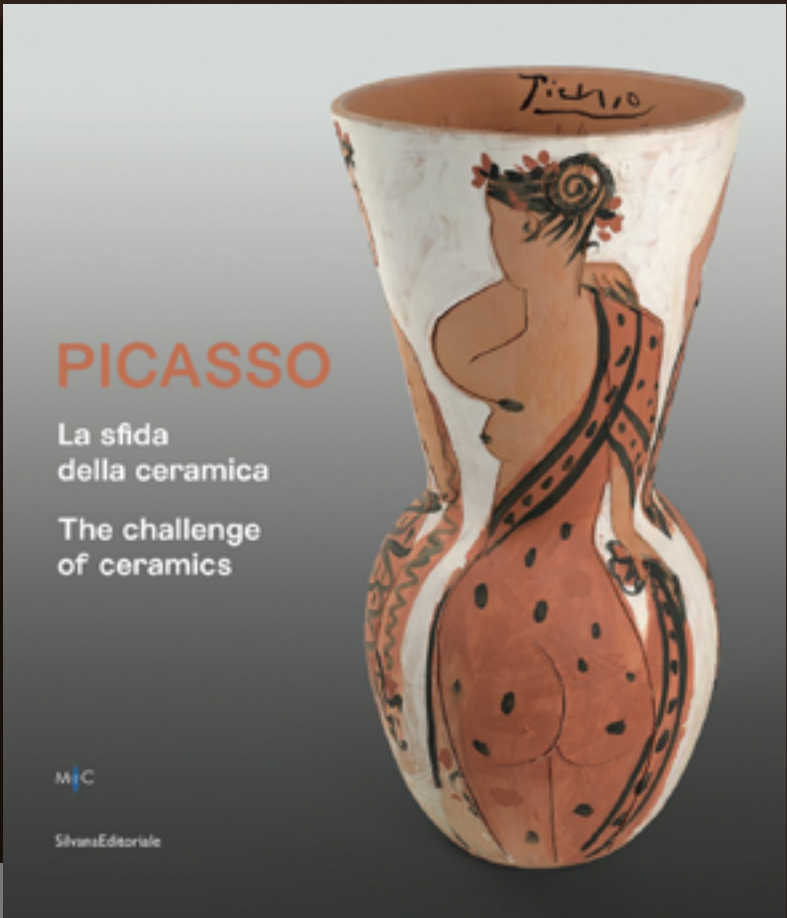
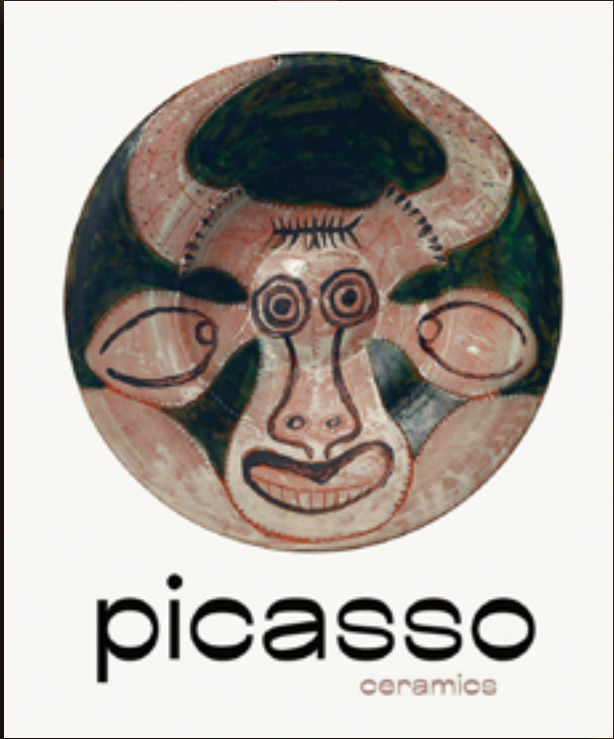

Art of Mexico and Central America traces cultural continuity and artistic innovation across the region. Musical instruments, ceremonial vessels, and ballgame equipment illuminate traditions that connected communities for thousands of years. Audience-favorite ceramic dog sculptures long featured in *Ceramics of Western Mexico* are joined by depictions of deities and nobles, as well as exquisite jade and gold jewelry that has not been displayed in decades. Reproductions of the sarcophagus lid of Pakal the Great and codices reveal sophisticated systems of writing and timekeeping. Raúl Anguiano's *The Mayas* (1999) engages with two millennia of history through painting.

Art of Mexico and Central America presents the art and culture of the region not as a closed chapter of the past, but as a living tradition that continues to evolve and inspire.

Traveling Beyond the Museum: A Bowers Fellows Journey to

SOUTHEAST ASIA

A small group of adventurous Fellows traveled to Indonesia and Southeast Asia to explore the remarkable destinations of Singapore, Java, and Borneo.

The journey began in Singapore, the dynamic global city and financial hub renowned for its rich blend of Chinese, Malay, Indian, Arab, and British cultural influences. From there, the group boarded a private flight to Yogyakarta on the island of Java, where they visited ancient temples, a private museum, the Sultan's Palace, and several UNESCO World Heritage sites. These experiences provided unique insights into the culture, heritage, arts, and crafts of the historic Central Javanese kingdom.

The adventure continued in Borneo at the beautiful Tanjung Puting National Park, where travelers observed a variety of wildlife in their natural habitats. A highlight of the visit was Camp Leakey, the renowned research and education center established in 1971, where older orangutans rescued from captivity are rehabilitated and reintroduced into the wild. The experience offered fascinating perspectives on conservation efforts and the region's extraordinary biodiversity.

The group then traveled to Makassar, Palopo, and Tana Toraja, where they enjoyed breathtaking scenery,

visits to UNESCO-recognized cultural sites, shopping in vibrant local markets, and outstanding regional cuisine. Throughout the journey, they gained a deeper appreciation for Indonesia's rich traditions and diverse cultural heritage.

The tour concluded in Makassar with a visit to a local Bugis village, where participants experienced daily life and learned about the community's rich maritime heritage and deeply rooted cultural traditions. Following a morning cruise aboard a traditional Indonesian *phinisi* sailing vessel, the travelers relaxed on the white sandy beaches of Samalona Island and enjoyed swimming in its crystal-clear waters. They then returned to Singapore to catch their flights home, bringing an unforgettable journey to a memorable close.

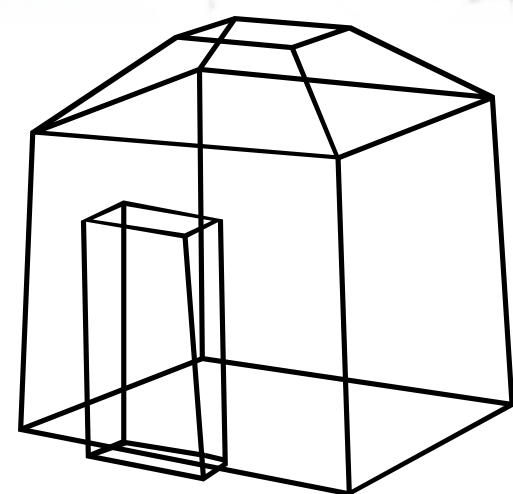
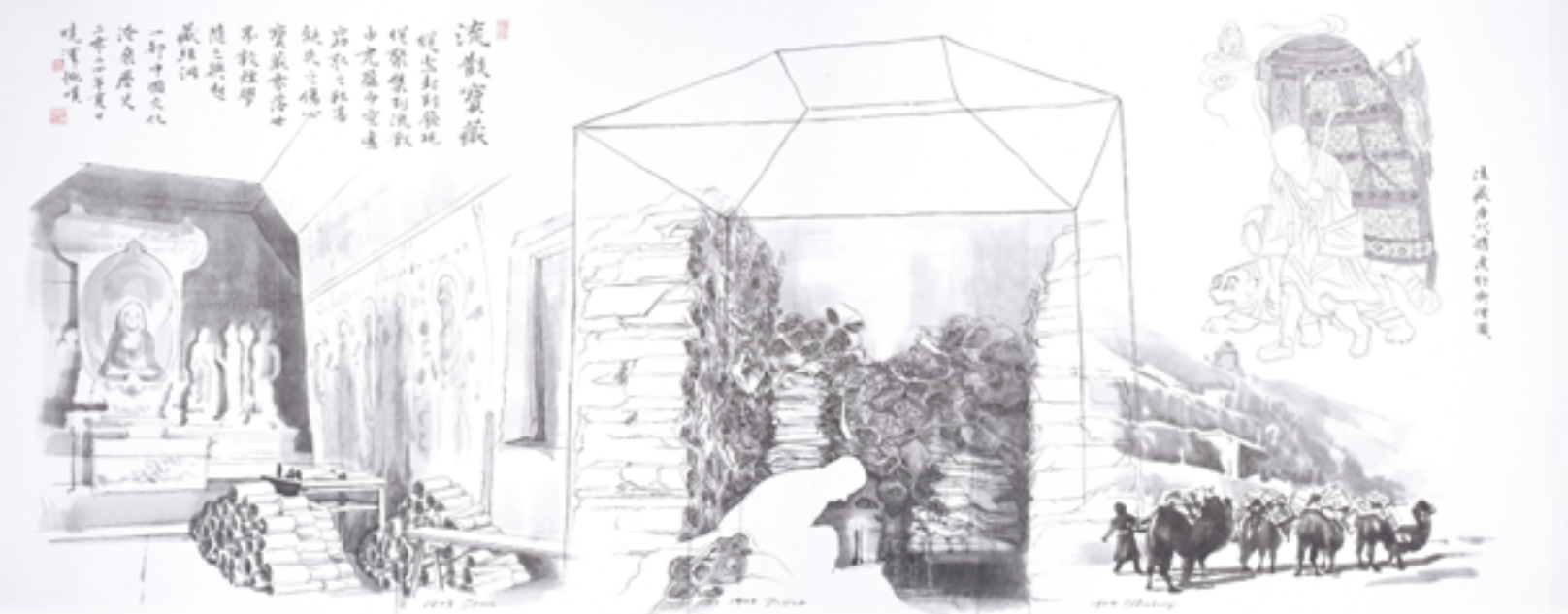

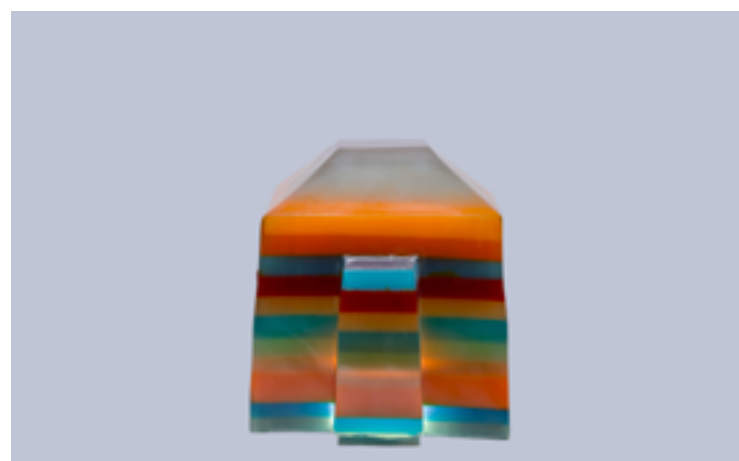
XIAOZE XIE

Reimagining the Library Cave at Dunhuang

Dec 12, 2026–Apr 25, 2027

How can the void of cultural treasures being stolen, scattered, or lost be filled? Contemporary artist Xiaoze Xie explores this question in his *Amber of History* series, an expansive project nearly a decade in the making that is being put on display in Bowers' upcoming *Xiaoze Xie: Reimagining the Library Cave at Dunhuang* exhibition.

Xie is an internationally recognized artist and the Paul L. & Phyllis Wattis Professor of Art at Stanford University. His work has been exhibited extensively in the US and internationally and he has received notable awards from organizations across the United States. Throughout his career, he has explored libraries as repositories of history and memory, and their inherent vulnerability to erasure and censorship.

This exhibition engages in similar themes, focusing on the Library Cave at Dunhuang, one of the 735 grottoes carved to create spaces for Buddhist meditation, worship, pilgrimage, and the display of sacred art. Discovered in 1900 by Wang Yuanlu, a Daoist priest, the sealed cave once held more than 70,000 manuscripts, paintings, and artifacts dating from the 4th to 11th centuries. Less than a decade later, this “Encyclopedia of the Middle Ages” had been ransacked by explorers who dispersed its contents across the world, leaving the cave completely empty.

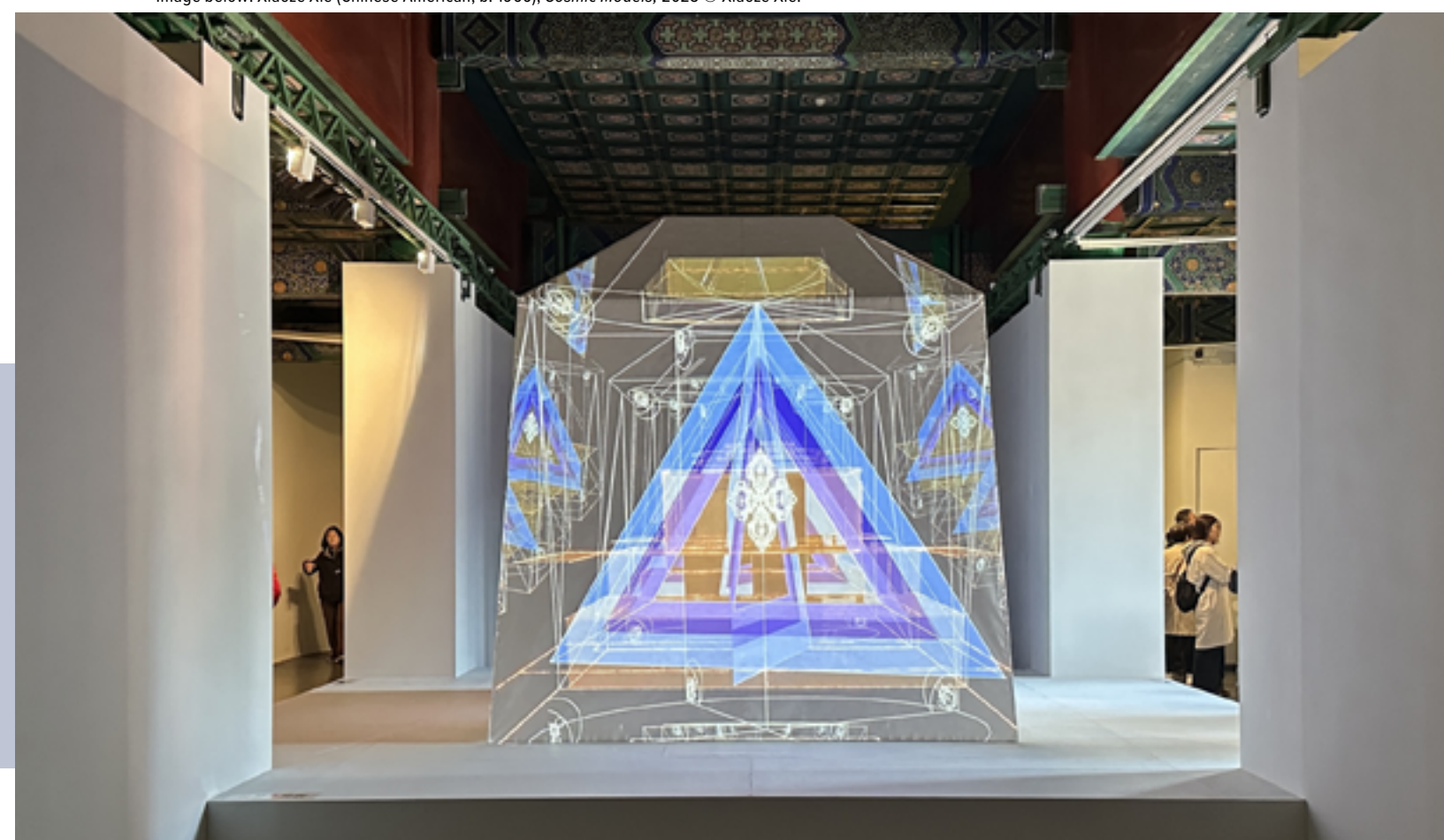
Xie developed *Amber of History* during and after his 2017 residency at the Dunhuang Academy. At its center is a monumental fifteen-part scroll that combines calligraphy, diagrams, and cosmological imagery to explore material culture, language, belief, and philosophy. The sections contain eleven themes, ranging from close examinations of the Library Cave’s original state and history to conceptualizations of the space as a vessel for the different cosmic models detailed in the Library Cave’s manuscripts. A celestial hemisphere formed from the oldest existing complete star chart discovered to date, three-dimensional mandalas, the natural mineral pigments used in painting the site’s murals, scrolls with their component parts rendered down and

flattened into geological strata, and much more all fill the emptiness of the Library Cave.

Extending his paintings into installations and sculptural forms, Xie produced a series of sculptures, video installations, and digital environments inspired by the grotto’s manuscripts, artifacts, and imagery, inviting visitors into evolving visions of history, memory, and the cosmos. Some of these, like the large *Cosmic Models* installation projection mapped onto the form of the Library Cave, breathe dimensionality into his study of the space while presenting his musings as transformative, ever-shifting microcosms. *Beholding Absence*, a video installation showing footage taken within the Library Cave looking out at visitors, reverses the relationship between viewer and subject. *Meditations on the Library Cave*, a VR experience, allows visitors to step into Xie’s vision of the cave itself.

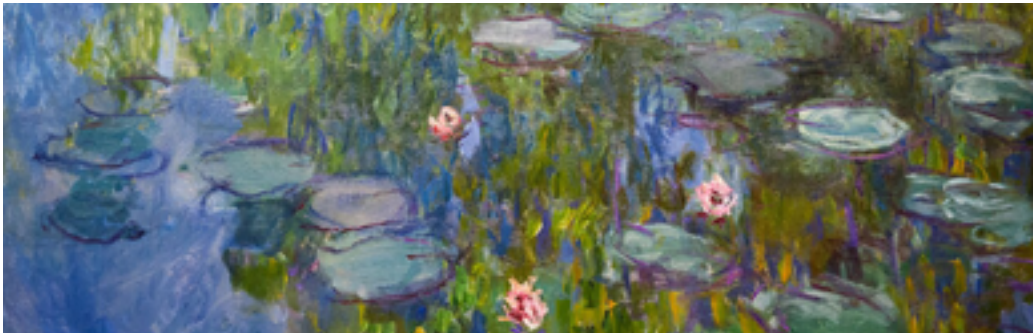

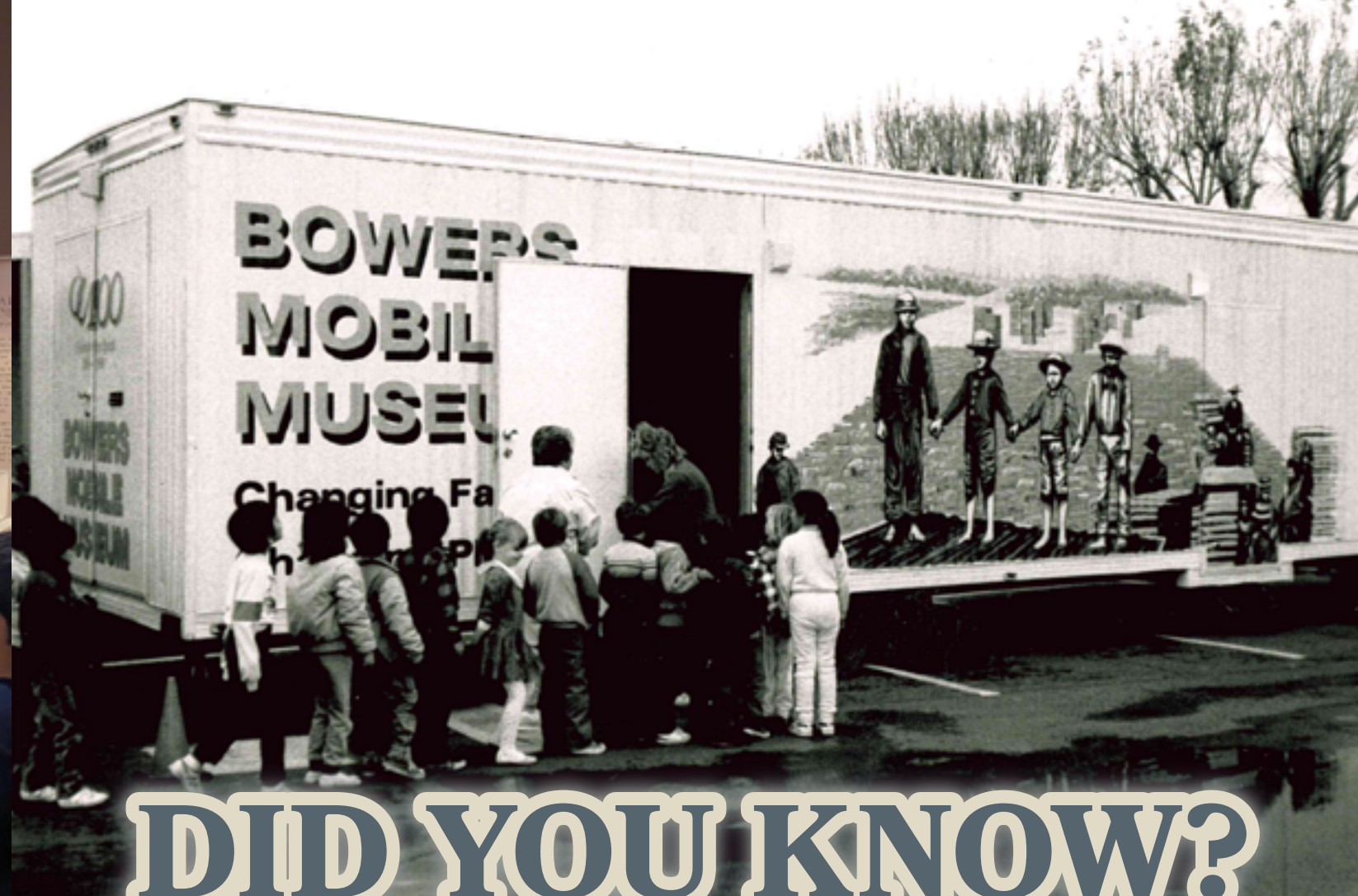

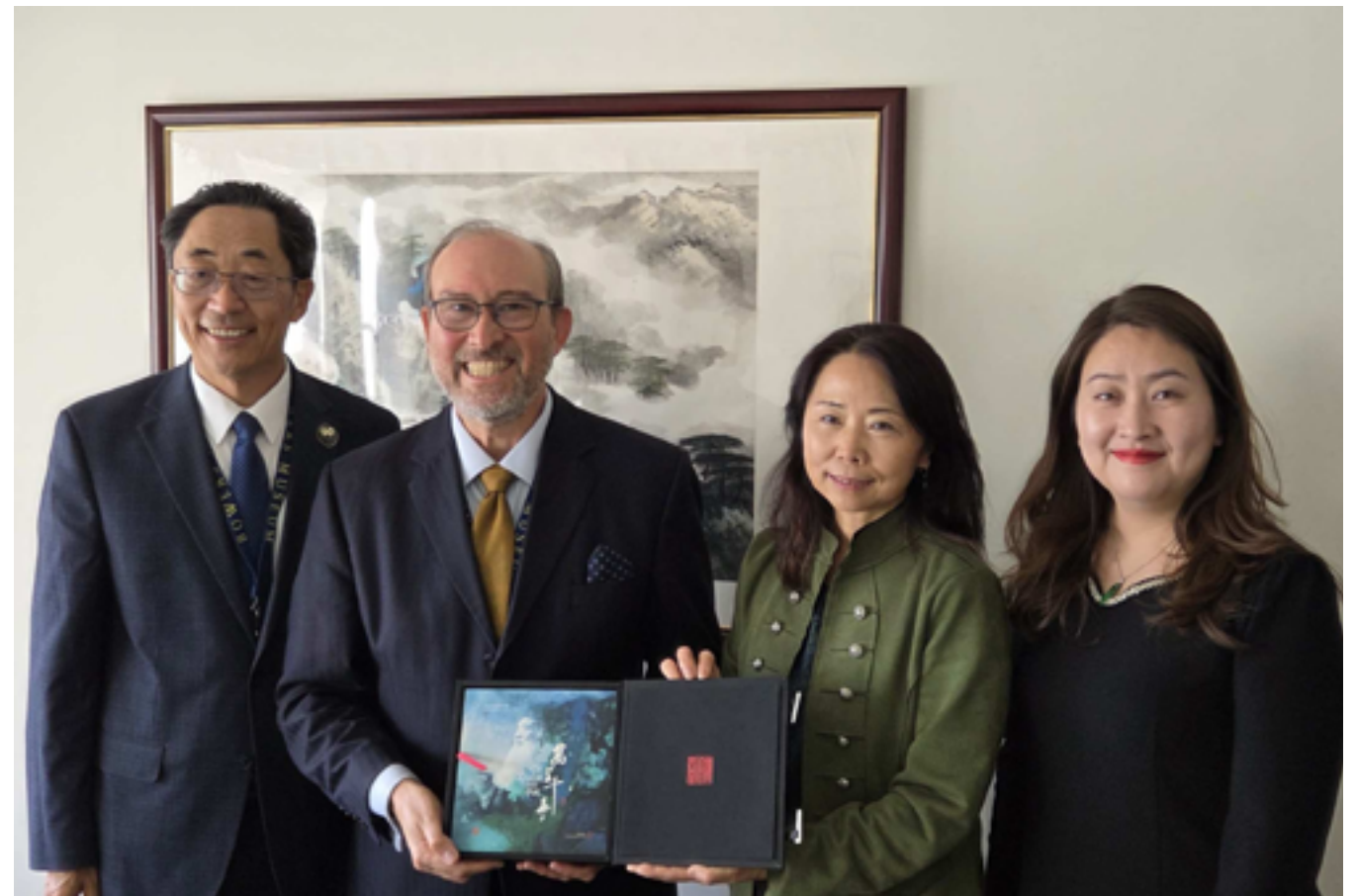
